



In 1990, New York University Press launched the Bobst Awards for Emerging Writers to support innovative, experimental, and important fiction and poetry. As the prestige of the awards has expanded in recent years, so too has their mandate. The awards were originally conceived to publish authors whose work had not yet appeared in book form. We now include authors who, while often already a known quantity, remain unrecognized relative to the quality and ambition of their writing.

We have thus renamed the awards the New York University Press Prize for Fiction and the New York University Press Prize for Poetry. In 1996, the jurors selected Jane Ransom's novel, Bye-Bye, and Anne Caston's collection of poems, Flying Out with the Wounded.
