





Teacher Guide

Introduction





One advantage to this approach to the study of a novel is that the student can work at his or her own speed, and the teacher can assign activities that match the student's abilities.


Our literature kit divides the novel by chapters and features reading comprehension and vocabulary questions. Themes include family relationships, self acceptance/awareness, courage, coming of age, the dangers of societal control and public apathy, the discovery of one's values, and individual rights versus the demands of society. The Giver provides a wealth of opportunity for classroom discussion because of its vivid portrayal of the central character, Jonas, and the unusual, yet riveting circumstances of his life.

How Is Our Literature Kit™ Organized?

STUDENT HANDOUTS

Chapter Activities (in the form of reproducible worksheets) make up the majority of this resource. For each group of chapters, there are BEFORE YOU READ activities and AFTER YOU READ activities.

• The BEFORE YOU READ activities prepare students for reading by setting a purpose for reading. They stimulate background knowledge and experience, and guide students to make connections between what they know and what they will learn. Important concepts and vocabulary from the chapter(s) are also presented.



Six **Writing Tasks** and three **Graphic Organizers** are included to further develop students' critical thinking and writing skills, and analysis of the text. (*See page 6 for suggestions on using the Graphic Organizers.*) The **Assessment Rubric** (*page 4*) is a useful tool for evaluating students' responses to the Writing Tasks and Graphic Organizers.

PICTURE CUES

This resource contains three main types of pages, each with a different purpose and use. A **Picture Cue** at the top of each page shows, at a glance, what the page is for.





Graphic Organizers

The three **Graphic Organizers** included in this **Literature Kit™** are especially suited to a study of **The Giver**. Below are suggestions for using each organizer in your classroom, or they may also be adapted to suit the individual needs of your students. The organizers can be used on a projection system or interactive whiteboard in teacher-led activities, and/or photocopied for use as student worksheets. To evaluate students' responses to any of the organizers, you may wish to use the **Assessment Rubric** (on page 4).



PERSUASION MAP

One of the reasons for the enduring popularity of *The Giver* is the thought-provoking issues that arise from a reading of the novel (i.e. freedom of choice; euthanasia; individual rights versus the responsibility of the state; the importance of diversity). The **Persuasion Map** requires that students highlight an issue raised in the novel; take a position on this issue, and defend it. Two reasons supporting their position are required, each of which are to be backed by two facts/examples from the novel or from other sources (readings/experience). **Found on Page 53**.

DIFFERENT PERSPECTIVES

As Jonas' eyes are opened by the Giver, he has an increasingly difficult time understanding how other people in the community can be so accepting of the way they are required to live their lives. The students' task is to compare the **perspectives** of at least two different characters as it relates to a specific issue in this novel. The issue should be a serious one (i.e. the releasing process; taking a pill to prevent "Stirrings"; having your career chosen for you; the absence of "love" in the community, etc.) Next, consider for each of the characters chosen their thoughts regarding this issue and the impact that it has on the way he or she conducts his or her life. **Found on Page 54**.



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STORY MAP

The Giver is an incredible award-winning novel, dealing with a most unusual theme and featuring a cast of unforgettable characters. Almost everything about this novel is unique: the setting (futuristic); characters (Jonas, the Giver, even Jonas' complicated parents); the problem (one so monumental that it can barely be grasped); an intriguing plot, and unforgettable resolution.
