




# **Teacher Guide**

# Our resource has been created for ease of use by both **TEACHERS** and **STUDENTS** alike.

## Introduction





One advantage to this approach to the study of a novel is that the student can work at his or her own speed, and the teacher can assign activities that match the student's abilities.

Our literature kit divides the novel by chapters and features reading comprehension and vocabulary questions. Themes include oppression, survival, sacrifice, and trust. The Hunger Games provides a wealth of opportunity for classroom discussion surrounding the universal issues that are raised during the narrative of this novel.

## How Is Our Literature Kit™ Organized?

## **STUDENT HANDOUTS**

**Chapter Activities** (in the form of reproducible worksheets) make up the majority of this resource. For each group of chapters, there are BEFORE YOU READ activities and AFTER YOU READ activities.

- The BEFORE YOU READ activities prepare students for reading by setting a purpose for reading. They stimulate background knowledge and experience, and guide students to make connections between what they know and what they will learn. Important concepts and vocabulary from the chapter(s) are also presented.
- The AFTER YOU READ activities check students' comprehension and extend their learning. Students are asked to give thoughtful consideration of the text through creative and evaluative short-answer questions and journal prompts.

Six **Writing Tasks** and three **Graphic Organizers** are included to further develop students' critical thinking and writing skills, and analysis of the text. (*See page 6 for suggestions on using the Graphic Organizers.*) The **Assessment Rubric** (*page 4*) is a useful tool for evaluating students' responses to the Writing Tasks and Graphic Organizers.

## **PICTURE CUES**

This resource contains three main types of pages, each with a different purpose and use. A **Picture Cue** at the top of each page shows, at a glance, what the page is for.










## **Graphic Organizers**

## **VENN DIAGRAM**

Understanding the different ways that Katniss and Peeta approach the Games gives students an understanding of how different personalities deal with extenuating circumstances. In addition, the way they survive shows that even people with different approaches share some commonalities. This activity demonstrates how people who believe they can achieve their goal are more likely to be successful. Found on Page 53.

#### **NEWSPAPER ARTICLE**

Guided writing provides students with the structure they need to write clearly. This Newspaper Article graphic organizer helps students understand the components of newspaper articles and assists them with structuring their writing in a concise way. Found on Page 54.





#### THE SCALE

The Scale demonstrates how the author uses suspense to hold the readers' attention. Each time Katniss and Peeta obtain an advantage in the Games, the Careers or Gamekeepers create obstacles that set them back.
